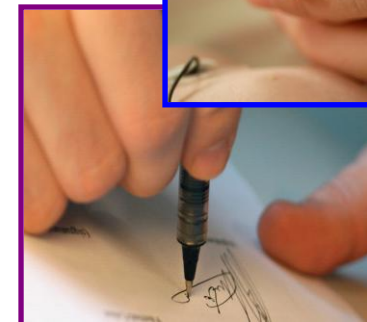

The Art of Palliative Care in the Emergency Department

Palliative care is a topic of discussion that emergency staff don't usually deal with. In the current climate it is an issue that healthcare workers in the emergency department have to face on a more frequent basis. Dr. Shona MacLachlan, an emergency physician in at the University of Alberta Hospital and previous ICU nurse will facilitate an interactive session and discussion on the Art of Palliative Care in the Emergency Department.

His interests are in the biology of coagulation and approaches to treat coagulation disorders. He will answer all your questions about this relatively new drug that is becoming more popular in patient care in a variety of settings.

One Pill Can Kill

There are seven deadly sins as there are seven deadly pills. Find out what medications can kill a child with just one pill. Dr. Duff, a full-time pediatric intensivist and assistant clinical professor at the Stollery Children's Hospital will take you through the deadly pills and clinical relevance of each of these toxins. Dr. Duff is currently the medical lead for pediatric simulation for Alberta Health Services and medical director of the pediatric rapid response team. He is an active member of the Transport Team, and a PALS Medical Director.

What is the definition of medical professionalism? How do we apply this in real life? Join Dr. Samina Ali in this interactive session and become more conscious of your own professionalism. Dr. Samina Ali is an Associate Professor (U. of Alberta) who specializes in pediatric emergency medicine, with a research interest in the management of acute pain in children. More recently she is developing a curriculum in Professionalism for the Faculty of Medicine & Dentistry.

Get It In Writing – A Legal Perspective on Charting!

Individuals in the caring profession are likely naturally inclined, as well as expected by others, to impart compassion and skillful precision into the patient experience and (consequently) a patient's chart. It is usually when a patient's health record goes before a court that (we) healthcare professionals realize the importance of paying such attention to every single word, acronym, and descriptor. Jane Steblecki, RN and lawyer practicing in the areas of health law and privacy law will explain the key functions of charting, namely: continuity of care, evaluation of care, and risk management. We will also explore how dedicated and trusted relationships with patients are likely the best defense against risk.
