The presentation will provide clear direction to service providers on how to best recognize and respond to this vulnerable and sometimes challenging population.

Since that time, Mark has beaten all the odds. He is a 3-time Marathon runner and a 4-time Half-Marathon runner. Mark has competed twice for Team Canada at the World Transplant Games and is an 8-time Canada Transplant Games Medalist. He is also a Best-Selling Author. His book: "Living Life from the Heart: 52 Weeks to a Better Life" has inspired thousands.

Mark has been speaking professionally for seven years and is the founder of his own speaking and consulting firm, Mark Black Speaks. He is frequently booked by associations, companies and schools to inspire people to "Live and Work with Passion and Purpose" and his presentation has now inspired more than 50,000 people across North America. She has also spent time working at the QEII emergency department in Halifax. Most recently, Denise has been employed as the critical care resource nurse for South Shore Health. She is a graduate of both the critical care nursing program and emergency nursing program in Halifax and she is also nationally certified in critical care. Denise has been closely involved with the orientation program of the new graduates and nurses with no previous experience in the emergency department and spends a great deal of time providing education and mentorship to the novice nurses in the emergency department.

Jeri Zinck

Is a registered nurse currently working for South Shore Health as the team leader in the emergency department. Jeri's career has spanned a multitude of nursing environments and she actually spent the beginning part of her career nursing in Miami. Upon her return to Canada, she worked in Halifax and then came to South shore Health where she has been working for over thirty years. Jeri has a tremendous amount of nursing experience, the majority of which has been obtained in the emergency department environment. She is a graduate of the critical care program and has worked in numerous leadership capacities throughout her career. She has also devoted a considerable amount of time to the orientation package for novice nurses in the emergency department. Jeri is committed to staff development and education and works closely with the team to make sure staff needs are met.

Nadine Stevens

Is currently the clinical services manager for the intensive care unit and the emergency department at South Shore Health. Nadine has had an expansive nursing career, predominantly in the intensive care unit and emergency department and has been in a managerial role since 2001. Through her positive and enthusiastic personality, Nadine continuously motivates the emergency nursing team. She has been very involved in recruiting new staff for the critical care environments and has not shied away from hiring new graduates. Working in collaboration with the team leader, critical care educator, frontline nurses and physician department leads, she has been instrumental in developing a comprehensive orientation package and mentorship program. She is a strong believer in life long learning as evidenced by her support for staff education and development.

Dr. Rose McCloskey

Is a nursing Professor at the University of New Brunswick, Saint John and also works on a casual basis as a staff nurse in the Emergency Room at the Saint John Regional Hospital. Her research interests are acute illness and hospitalization of older adults, particular nursing home residents in the emergency room. She has received numerous research grants to fund her research, has published in several peer-reviewed journals and presented at many local, national and international conferences. She is a past recipient of the Canadian Nurses Association Dr. Anne Beckingham award for excellence in Gerontological Nursing Practice and a gold medal from the Governor General for her research. She is originally from Cape Breton Nova Scotia but now resides in Quispamsis with her husband and their two daughters.

The presentation will share findings from a study on resident transfers between a nursing home and an ER in Atlantic Canada. Observations were made of how ER transfer decisions were made in one nursing home. Residents were also accompanied on their transfers, including the ambulance transport to and from the ER, and their entire ER visit. Particular attention was paid to how information was transferred between sites and how staff interacted across sites. This presentation will highlight some of the key findings of this study and will provide recommendations for improving resident transfers and to ensure more appropriate use of precious ER resources.

Ali Pishe

Ali Pishe is a Nurse Practitioner at St. Joseph's Urgent Care Centre and also works as a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner and Project Coordinator for the greater Saint John Sexual Assault Response Team. Her background is in Emergency Nursing where she first encountered victims of sexual assault. Ali has an interest in women's health and equality issues, and since 2005 she has been dedicated to improving the community based response to sexual assault in the greater Saint John area.

Implementing a Sexual Assault Response Team: A Community Effort

Sexual Assault Response Teams have been a successful solution to care and service delivery, addressing the physical and psychosocial needs of victims acutely and over the long-term. No one agency can successfully handle all aspects of a sexual assault. Collaboration among community partners is necessary and strengthens the response of each individual agency, ultimately benefitting the victim. The SART model is an exciting and innovative service delivery model aiming to provide victims of sexual assault the care and support they deserve.

Nathalie Boivin

A registered nurse, completed a Master in Community Health (Health Promotion Option) with the Department of Médecine Sociale et Préventive of the Faculté des sciences de l'alimentation de l'Université Laval. Since 1998, she is a Professor with the Science Infirmière de l'Université de Moncton, Campus de Shippagan, Bathurst site. Her research interests are in the field of Health Promotion, Community Health and, for the last six years, Health Literacy. Nathalie is involved in numerous committees either at the national, provincial or regional levels. Member of the board of directors of the Société santé et mieux-être en français du NB, and involved with the Mouvement Acadien des Communautés en santé du Nouveau-Brunswick. In collaboration with the Bathurst Healthy Community network, she has initiated a francophone network of healthy schools, conducted a Health literacy project entitled "Capsules-santé pour mieux vivre" and, more recently, organized the annual celebration of the National Health day activities held on May 12.

Health & Literacy: What Every Nurse Should Know

The 2003 International Adult Literacy & Skills Survey (IALSS) reported that 55% of the New Brunswick population, and 68% of the francophone population, 16 and over, presented literacy scores that are below what is required to function in today's society. A low literacy skill population faces numerous difficulties to access health services and health related information. This is compelling and hints to the necessity for Nurses to review their professional practice.

Taryn McKenzie

Taryn has worked in the Emergency Department at the Civic Campus of the Ottawa Hospital since 1991 and has been one of the Nurse Educators in this department for close to nine years. Taryn gained experience with Dr. Ian Stiell's emergency research as a research assistant with the "Canadian C-Spine Rule" and "Canadian CT Head" studies. She has enjoyed the experience of working along side Christine Beland as lead ED educators with the Nursing C-spine Study since its introduction to the introduction to the ED nurses in 2005.

Christine Béland

Christine started her emergency nursing career in 1981. She is currently a full time Emergency Nurse Educator at the General Campus of the Ottawa Hospital. Over the years she has been actively involved in developing Emergency Department Nursing Standards and protocols to improve emergency nursing care. While she has worked collaboratively with Taryn for several years she has been particularly pleased to have partnered with Taryn as co-lead in the educational roll out of the Emergency Nursing C-spine study.

Emergency Nurses Clearing C-Spines

ED Nurses at the Ottawa Hospital have been involved with the Emergency Nursing C-Spine Study since 2005. This presentation will focus on the educational roll out of the study where Emergency Nurses have been empowered to clear the c-spine utilizing the application of the "Canadian C-Spine Rule." It will also provide an update on the progress of the study. The presentation will conclude with a practical demonstration regarding assessment of a patient using the "Canadian C-Spine Rule."

Dana Manzer

Dana graduated SJ School of Nursing in 1991, BN from UNB 2004, and Nurse Practitioner in 2008. She has 20 years experience in a variety of practice settings including CCU, Nurse Associate with cardiac surgery, emergency, internal medicine, and as a Nurse Manager. Presently Nurse Practitioner and Clinical Operations Manager for the Low Threshold, High Tolerance Uptown Methadone Clinic – the first clinic of its kind in Eastern Canada – which opened in Aug 2009.

Nurse Practitioners – Coming to an Emergency Room Near you? The focus of this presentation will be on providing attendees with an overview of the role of Nurse Practitioners (education, training, ordering and prescriptive authority, skill set), barriers/challenges that currently exist, and evidence that supports the integration of NPs in the ER setting.

Methadone – Changing the Lives of Opiate Abusers

It will provide some statistics on opiate abuse, various presentations of substance abusers in the ER, how to recognize signs of IV drug use, medical sequelae of substance abuse and what nursing staff should be on the lookout for (ie when a fever not a fever but endocarditis?), harm reduction philosophy, and the role of methadone in the management of opiate abuse.

Sue Ness

Executive Director of Zone 1, Moncton New Brunswick's Horizon Health Network. Her 30+ year nursing career has spanned practice, education administration in both the community and acute care settings. She has held positions such as clinical coordinator, Director of Extra Mural & Primary Care, Chief Nursing Officer, VP of Acute Care & now Executive Director. She has also been very active in professional association activities, having served as VP for the Canadian Association of Nurses in Oncology, President of the Nurses Association of New Brunswick and an active Board member of CAN serving on the executive committee, and currently as an elected member for CAN's committee on nominations. In her other life she enjoys outdoor pursuits such as swimming, hiking, skiing and camping and is equally proud of her personal roles as wife, mother and "Nan."

Jacques has many years with the RCMP and will share his expertise in forensic evidence collection, gunshot wounds and tasers.

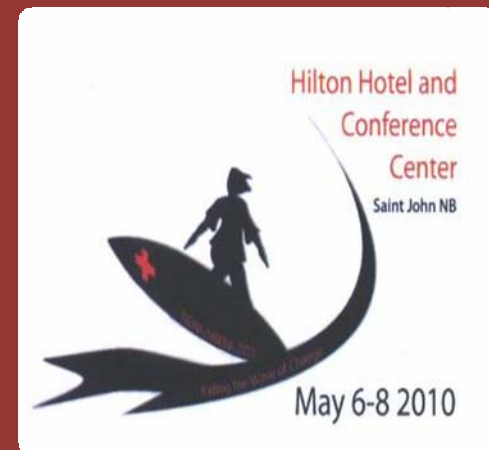

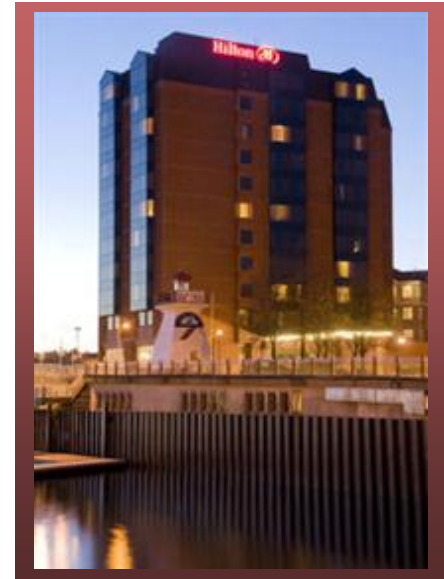
